TRIP REPORTS

Northern Saw-whet Owl Banding - Debbie Harrison

On Wednesday, Nov 19, 2025, nine members of RBC (Kate & Zachary, Alex, Matt, with Micah & Lydia, Greg & Barbara) headed up to the Highland Retreat Saw-whet Owl Banding station. We met the current banders, Ben Spory & helpers Reece & Clay.

The banders allowed us to go to the nets, and 6 owls were returned for measuring and banding. They usually get females (since the call is from the male Saw-whet owl). The banders returned to the nets a second time and returned with 2 more owls.

The owls all got measured and banded! Everyone got up-close looks at these cute birds while learning what data the Banding station captures. Banders recorded information and measurements from each owl, banded them, and held them for photos before releasing them back into the night.

Starry Meadows Walk - Herb Myers

On Friday, November 7th, 16 people arrived at Starry Meadows near Singers Glen for a bird walk. It was a beautiful morning but chilly and windy. The birds did not disappoint us. We tallied 33 species. Cedar Waxwings were the winning species with at least 50 counted. The hoped for Red-headed Woodpeckers ended up with four. There were plenty of Eastern Bluebirds as we counted 13. The most common sparrows were the Chipping Sparrows. The only warblers were 8 Yellow-rumped Warblers. Both Black and Turkey Vultures soared overhead along with Red-tailed Hawks. It was a good morning to be out. Thanks to Jay and Sharon Landis for hosting us.

November Hillandale Walk - Tom Mizell

The Tuesday November 11, 2025, Hillandale Park walk began with the temperature at 27°. The morning was sunny with winds out of the southwest as 6 members of the Rockingham Bird Club shivered a bit as we gathered at 8:30 AM at Shelter number 12. Nathaniel Shank was the youngest at 5. It was very nice to have Nathaniel with us! Our wish-list birds were Golden-crowned Kinglet, Hermit Thrush, Fox Sparrows-note plural, Brown Creeper and Red-breasted Nuthatch. Can you guess which three we saw during our 2 1/2 hour walk?

The woodpeckers were busy early as we had Red-bellied Woodpecker, Downy Woodpecker, and Yellow-bellied Sapsucker. By the time we crossed the pedestrian bridge and passed the northwest corner we added Dark-eyed Junco, Carolina Wren, Bluejay, Purple Finch, White-breasted Nuthatch, and Carolina Chickadee.

We searched for the Eastern Screech Owl at the usual tree to no avail, but Mike Donaldson spotted a Golden-crowned Kinglet, and we all got great views of this cooperative little bird. To see the flash of the golden crown is always a treat. As we journeyed on toward the concrete slab we added American Goldfinch, Eastern Bluebird, Hermit Thrush (second wish-list bird) and Turkey Vulture. Tom spied a Brown Creeper on the branches overhead and we all got good looks at our third wish-list bird. A Tufted Titmouse and an American Robin raised our sightings to 17 species by 9:30 and the temperature had crept to 31 degrees. It was a COLD 31!

We approached the trail fork near the old log cabin site and were treated to very good looks at a Yellow-bellied Sapsucker. Mike spotted a Northern Flicker. Then a Northern Cardinal pair flitted back and forth across the trail. About this time some of us got sidetracked by bowling with this year's bumper crop of Osage Oranges. Some adults can't resist selecting a nice round Osage Orange and rolling it down the trail towards an unsuspecting tree. No doubt we will see deer and squirrels browsing on the sticky fruits in the winter months ahead.

A Yellow-rumped Warbler, White-throated Sparrow and the distant calling of an American Crow took our tally to 22. We reached the fork at 9:40 AM. At 10 AM it was 33 degrees and the windchill was 26. Brrrrrrrr. I had to leave, and three brave birders carried on in the frigid conditions. They headed west on the Bike Trail and added Bald Eagle, (why didn't I hang around for another few minutes!) Northern Mockingbird, White-crowned Sparrow and Song Sparrow. These additions took our count to 26 species for the day. Little did we know that the evening would bring a pleasant surprise of a spectacular Aurora Borealis to our area.

Our next Hillandale walk will be Tuesday 9 December. Bundle up well, join us and get in some practice before the Christmas Bird Count.

BIRD SIGHTINGS

After having an **Eastern Screech-Owl** visit her yard water feature in late October, Diane Lepkowski put up an owl box. One week later, on Nov. 3, Diane got photos of an owl occupying the box. Diane later got a video clip of the owl flying into the box.

Just south of Rockingham Co., Bill Benish and Robyn Puffenbarger had a **Fox Sparrow** at their place in Verona on Nov. 7. On Nov. 9, Robyn spotted six **Western Cattle Egrets** in a field just off I-81 in Augusta Co. The egrets then flew over to the pond at the Verona Hardee's.

Mike Smith reported two **Wood Ducks** and eight **Green-winged Teal** at Leonard's Pond off Faughts Rd on Nov. 10.

Herb Myers reported three **Fox Sparrows**, **Eastern Towhees**, and **Purple Finches** at his place in Keezletown on Nov. 15.

Diane Lepkowski reported two Great Egrets at Lake Shenandoah on Nov. 16.

Mike Smith spotted a Golden Eagle flying over his place east of Elkton on Nov. 19.

Five **Red-breasted Mergansers** were reported at Lake Shenandoah on Nov. 20 and remained for several days.

A **Bonaparte's Gull**, a **Cackling Goose**, and a **Snow Goose** have been reported at the Broadway Wastewater Treatment Plant between Nov. 20 - 24.

Big Flat Christmas Bird Count Information

Big Flat CBC, located within the South District of Shenandoah National Park, was established as a high elevation count to provide a comparison to the numerous CBC's that are in the surrounding Valley or Piedmont regions. Here is the description from the National Audubon Society's CBC website:

Historically, the count has primarily been a walking count. Many years have had only walking miles, no miles by auto. It is desired that this be continued for consistency's sake and in the spirit of mountain birding. Road access is very limited, but walking routes from road and trail access points can be worked out. Please contact the compiler for this. The area is predominantly forested. Being a mountainous area, it is generally cold, often windy, and birds can be few in number and diversity. From the outset, the count was intended to draw a comparison between birdlife in the mountains and that of surrounding lower elevations. If you're interested in more information about the count, a 50-year summary (1955-2007) is published in The Raven 88(2):9-20(2018).

If you enjoy the solitude of winter hiking, this count is for you! The date for the count will be decided based on the availability of participants. RBC 50 Years Ago - Art Fovargue, Club historian

The Rockingham Bird Club tied up its first year with the December newsletter. It began with this emphatic line from the poem *Quiet Roads* by Lou Ella Archer:

Give me the winding road, and let me stray from the custom-beaten paths.

A photographic journey to Alaska by Homer Mumaw (EMC) was announced for the December meeting. The Christmas Bird Count was announced to take place on December 20 (same as this year!) with all those interested to meet "at 7:30 on the banks of Silver Lake."

A summary of the 1975 Fall migration bird banding at the Dolly Sods station was included. The total number of birds banded was 3889 (72 species). The species with the highest number banded was the Tennessee Warbler with 661. A new station record was set for the Red-breasted Nuthatch with 72 captured. Lastly a survey was included to take the pulse of the membership. It included questions on programs, the field trips, a bird alert system, a county bird sightings record system and more.

Christmas Bird Count, Saturday, December 20 – Bill Benish


